

The Business of the PRA

Board Officer and Committee Chairs Elections for 2025-2026

On June 9, the PRA Board of Directors voted to reelect the slate of officers as presented. The elected officers are **Ruth Scanlan**, President; **Don Foster**, Vice President; **Peter Clark**, Secretary; **Bob Ruckstuhl**, Treasurer and Membership Chair; and **Dan Cence**, Finance Committee Chair.

The **Annual May Luncheon** is the Polaroid Retirees Association Board of Directors' forum for sharing the fiscal year's business information with the larger membership. Below is a summary of the presentations.

2024 Secretary's Report: Peter Clark, Secretary

The PRA Board of Directors met fourteen times during 2024, once/month & special planning sessions. The Governance Commission met once to revise the PRA's Constitution and By-laws.

2024 Treasurer's Report: Bob Ruckstuhl, Treasurer

Total income for the fiscal year was \$25,814 (Dues \$8,264, Luncheon Reimbursements \$16,274, Miscellaneous Receipts \$1,279.) Total expenses were \$25,112, resulting in a surplus of \$702. The major expenses were the Spring Luncheon (\$11,753 for which the Direct Federal Credit Union reimbursed the PRA), the Fall Luncheon (\$5,183), and the Newsletter & Administration (\$5,512). It bears noting that, without the support of the Direct Federal Credit Union, our current plan of two luncheons per year would not be financially possible. Thank you DFCU!

The PRA Budget for 2025 reflects modest increases in spending due to the increase in cost of our luncheons and increases in spending to upgrade our website and make it more user friendly. The \$5 increase in dues that went into effect on January 1, 2025 will help cover the increased spending.

The PRA closed their 2024 fiscal year with a reserve of \$26,890 of which \$7,750 is restricted for special use.

2024 Audit Committee Report: Dan Cence, Audit Committee Chair

In accordance with the requirements of our Constitution, the Audit Committee, comprising Arthur Aznavorian and Dan Cence, conducted an audit in April of 2024 of the financial transactions of the Treasurer during 2023. The scope of the audit covered all deposits, operating expenses, bank account and trust interest. The audit was accomplished by taking randomly chosen entries on the deposit and expense sides of the PRA checking account and comparing them to backup documentation provided by the Treasurer. All transactions were found to be in good order; the organization is solvent as was so reported at the 2024 May Annual Meeting of the Association.

2024 Membership Committee Report: Bob Ruckstuhl, Membership Chair

Since 2010 the Polaroid Retirees Association has experienced an annual average net loss of 56 members per year resulting from deaths and resignations. After loss of only 27 (3.5%) members the PRA closed 2024 with a total membership of 777 (174 Lifetime members, 70 Non-paying members, and 533 Paying members).

As stated in my 2023 Membership Committee Report, "If the Membership continues to decline in the future as it has in the past, our membership numbers in the early 2030s will signal the end of the PRA."

Drew Webb Elected to the PRA Board of Directors

In 1972, Drew Webb joined Polaroid. In 1974, Drew started Polaroid's Law Enforcement and Marketing Group and worked on Polaroid's ID and security image recording strategy. Drew was Polaroid's corporate representative to the Professional Photographers of America and taught industrial photography.

In 1999, after 26 years with Polaroid, Drew left and started a variety of identification services, and he continues to be a marketing consultant in security and forensics. (See PhotoBiometrics, LLC, based in North Salem, NH.)

Drew is active in law enforcement and photographic associations.

His most visible role was Emcee of raffles at the Luncheons. Conversations stopped and laughter started as he drew names and joyfully presented winners with wines he'd studiously curated.

For several years, Touie served as Committee Chair for New Members. He made himself visible at various retirees' group gatherings, and talked with those who either hadn't heard about the PRA or weren't sure it would be valuable for former employees. He handed out the latest *Newsletter*, explained our work and gave enticing reasons for joining.

Touie is retiring from the Board of Directors for the second time since his first election in 1999. We hope there's a third in your future, Touie, and we'll welcome you back when you come to the door. We will sorely miss your energy and humor. Best wishes and thank you very, very much.

Mac's Aura of Polaroid

Mac Booth opened PRA's 40th Jubilee Luncheon with his thoughtful remembrances of 4 decades at Polaroid. The 156 attendees knew Mac as Polaroid's third President, and Chairman of the Board. Mac began his talk by saying, "It is a super pleasure to be with my family. It is a pleasure to be here with a family like Polaroid. It was a family for me, and it still is. I am really happy to be here. In preparation, I recalled my feelings about the Aura of Polaroid. It permeates all of us. Webster says Aura is an atmosphere surrounding a person or place. That atmosphere is what got me here."

In 1958, after Cornell Graduate School and the Air Force he looked for a job. Mac was recruited by **Bob Palmer**, Personnel. Mac read up on **Dr. Land**, and came for interviews. Mac said, "There was something special about Polaroid that was hard to describe, and I hoped to be hired"

Mac started on July 1, 1958. He was hired as a film production supervisor trainee. The next day Dr. Land had an annual all company meeting, and Mac attended. He said that Dr. Land paced up and down while speaking. Dr. Land said that "...supervisors got in the way of employees expanding their creativity". Mac took that as a challenge. "How do you manage people?" Mac's career began working with 6 people under the supervision of **Ernestine Harrington**. "She was a tough nut, but a wonderful lady, a wonderful supervisor, and I learned from her. After 7 months I was a manager."

Mac's new job put him in contact with people he recalled in his talk. As an intro, Mac said that a company has to have a product, and that product has to make money. Land invented products that were nearly impossible to make. Mac added, "You have to have a group of people that you can trust to deliver the product. Land gathered around him really remarkable people who not only gave us the technical expertise, but also they were good people. They brought that feeling of trust; they really cared about you; they were hard guys and gals; they demanded stuff; but it was in the atmosphere of family."

"Bill McCune was my mentor, so I have a very passionate feeling about Bill. He was a remarkable guy! I do not think Bill received the credit for everything he did. He really was a backup to Land in many ways. Land had great visions of products. Our competition with Kodak forced us to introduce the SX-70 camera to the public a little prematurely. And Bill was the backstop. He got things rolling in that very stressful time at the start of SX-70 manufacturing. Bill had not only great engineering skills, but also he had a real heart. He was a strong, strong supporter of the importance of Inner City, and the creation of Polaroid jobs in Roxbury. By the way, Bill lived to be 102, I hope that is in the genes of the job".

"There was a guy by the name of **Dick Kriebel.** A remarkable guy! Land painted the big picture of Polaroid's Second Aim, and Dick put together many different programs. He was a very gentle, but very a brilliant guy".

"Charlie Mikulka was the patent lawyer who defended Land's earliest patent on sheet polarizers. There were two patent appeals that disputed Land's patent. Charlie took that case, and won it. He was a brilliant patent lawyer, and he had

a heart as big as this room. He was the go-between of the Employees' Committee and Management. He took over when **Dave Skinner** retired."

"Otto Wolf was an early Land-Wheelwright employee. Edwin Land told me this story. In the earliest days of Polaroid Corporation, Land wanted to sell the company's first sheet polarizers to Kodak as a glare reduction filter for Kodak cameras. Land and Otto drove to Rochester, N.Y. in Land's Buick convertible. They slept in a field that night because they did not have the money for a hotel room. They got dressed up in a gas station for their meeting in Kodak Park. They sold Kodak their Polaroid filters. Otto was a character-and-a-half, and a brilliant engineer. When you scratched under that skin of his, he was absolutely a great guy. He led the design of all that film manufacturing equipment in Waltham. A wonderful guy."

"Land was a genius. We all know that! He had the ideas, but, he needed a team to implement that thing. Land brought in Dave Skinner from GE. He ran manufacturing, and finance. Land knew he needed someone to bring all the manufacturing people together, and get things done. Dave was the glue that did that. He was the General Manager (Number 2), when I joined the company. Again, he was a guy with high morals and high values."

"Howie Rogers, I cannot forget Howie. It's hard to describe Howie! He was kind, quiet, solid, brilliant guy. Like Land, he was a Harvard dropout. He worked to help his parents at a South Boston gas station for \$25/week. Land-Wheelwright hired him for \$10/week. He was a genius in the Instant Color field. His patents were the ones that defeated Kodak. Again, a lovable guy, with high standards of values."

Mac said, "I feel very blessed that I was a part of Polaroid. It is hard to describe. I feel good: I feel very good today about this. A practical way of describing this Polaroid Aura is to recall the historic 1978 snow storm. That was a corker! We had a lot of employees, on their own, bring shovels in, to shovel out the sidewalks and parking lots in Waltham. That is something special! No one asked them to come; they just came. That is part of the Aura that I am trying to describe; that Aura is quite unique and wonderful."

During the takeover attempt by Gold and Disney, one of Polaroid's Board of Directors, a really good thoughtful guy, came up to Mac and said, "Why are you getting so excited, and caring so much. It is just a business deal." Mac replied "Well, it's more than that! The takeover was going to tear the company apart. The only people benefiting from the takeover were the new owners. So for me, this was our attempt to hold the family together. We were successful, with the good work of a lot of people."

"I see that same Aura today, here. I saw it up here with the PRA Directors. I think today is something special. It is something we can all feel proud about."

"So, I am going to wind it up. Thank you! Bob, thank you, and thank all of the folks who have put so much effort into all that the PRA has done over these 40 years. I read all the *Newsletters*. I read all the *In Memoriam* biographies.

"It is a pleasure to be here. Thank you for coming."

Where Did The Time Go? by Edyie Johnson, New Bedford

Most of the people reading this PRA newsletter worked for Polaroid Corp. The building location and number of years would be different for each of them but they probably all have memories of their time spent working there.

Do you remember your clock number? Do you remember your telephone extension number? Do you remember the date you started working at Polaroid?

I spent all my 26 years of Polaroid working life in the New Bedford Negative Manufacturing Plant. It was a beautiful building with beautiful grounds. Today, most of the building is gone; as are the beautiful grounds but that is another story for another day.

Why do we remember certain events? I remember a **Malik Ali** started the same day as I did. I remember spelling Polaroid wrong on my application and just knowing that I wouldn't get hired if I couldn't even spell the name of the company correctly. I remember being really scared the day I started working in NB-1. There were just so many people working there that I didn't know and I was overwhelmed.

Who was your first supervisor? Who was the Plant Manager when you started at Polaroid? There were so many things to deal with but one thing helped in easing the nerves. Friends. Co-workers were the best. It wasn't long before **Sue Cusick** and **Judy Ellis** became my friends. During the gas crisis in the 1970s, we carpooled to save gas. It was a great time. I learned that some people made up their weekly dinner and lunch menus a week ahead of time so they could make up their grocery shopping list. Who knows what they want to eat 7 days from now? Judy and Sue did and it worked for them. Car-pooling was educational.

Having a cafeteria at your disposal was new to me. Hot breakfast and lunch available was the best but it was also educational. One day they had something called mulligatawny soup. Never in my life had I heard of that. Who knew of a soup with apples? So many things to learn.

As mentioned, co-workers were the best. During one of our Administrative Secretarial meetings, **Patty Page** announced to us that she had just become the Speed Limit. It was her 55th birthday (the speed limit at that time). Of course, now the speed limit has changed but I never forgot Patty's birthday after that day.

Working with the Finance Group was memorable. Life long friends were made there. The year all of us were waiting for **Jim Mitcheson**'s beeper to go off signaling he had to leave as his daughter was about to be born. The number of Team Building sessions we had on someone's boat. At one point, I had a speaker by my computer and could play my CDs. Not sure now how that happened but listening to music during the day was great. It wasn't until I left that a co-worker informed me that that she enjoyed my singing to songs from Les Miserable, my all-time favorite play. I had no clue anyone could hear me but who cared now as I had retired.

Of course, we had to take the Left Brain, Right Brain course to see why we were different from each other. I clearly remember sitting in a semi-circle in the 6th floor Learning Center conference room getting our results. We were shown a cartoon movie. Very quickly, the right side of the group is laughing and enjoying the cartoon. Myself and **John Lopes** (a Finance co-worker and friend) were on the far Left, just sitting there wondering what they were laughing at. I was an ISTJ.

Twenty six years at Polaroid flew by. I got my B.S. degree from U Mass Dartmouth during those 26 years; to this day, still have lunch with my friends Judy and Susan, and have contact with many other Polaroid friends. I also still have my Polaroid 25th anniversary rocking chair. It's hard to believe that 2025 marks 26 years since I retired from Polaroid. Yikes!! Time does fly.
